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Updates to the FFY2024-2026 Triennial Highway Safety Plan §1300.12(b)(1)

Wyoming's 2024 - 2026 Triennial Highway Safety Plan was submitted to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) on June 30, 2023. Due to this submission date, the State of Wyoming has made no updates to any analysis in the plan. This includes:

The consultant will also be required to maintain a roster of all active CPS instructors, instructor candidates, CPS technicians and track all certification hours. As part of this process, administrative, technical, and material assistance will need to be provided to all CPS volunteers and personnel. The statewide network of child restraint inspection stations will be monitored and maintained. The child passenger restraint misuse rate will be tracked for each county and the state for federal reporting requirements. On Track: Yes

Wyoming had 144 fatalities in 2023 per WECRS and as of May 31, 2024, there have been approximately 29 fatalities per the Wyoming Highway Patrol (WHP) records. Wyoming is on course to meet the goal of a five (5) year running average of 134 or less fatalities by 2026.

The HSO funds state and local projects and activities that target the primary focus areas: occupant protection and impaired driving as well as an emphasis on distracted driving, speeding, motorcycle safety, vulnerable roadway users, and traffic record improvements.

The HSO engages with the public to understand the perspective of high-risk groups identified by data to incorporate into projects that will be a catalyst in changing dangerous driving behaviors. A data driven approach focusing efforts and resources on education, enforcement, and providing resources in communities such as SafeRide. The HSO will continue to fund projects that have a propensity to make an impact on all Wyoming's State and Core Performance Measures.

C-2) Number of serious injuries in traffic crashes (State crash data files) On Track: Yes

Wyoming had 457 serious injuries in 2023 per WECRS. Wyoming is on course to meet the goal of a five (5) year running average of less than 481 serious injuries by 2026.

C-3) Fatalities/VMT (FARS, FHWA)

On Track: No

Based on current FARS available data, the 2021 FARS Fatalities/VMT is at .99, however, State data indicates that the 2023 fatality rate is at 1.51. Wyoming is not on course to meet the goal of a five (5) year running average of less than 1.46 fatalities/MVT by 2026.

C-4) Number of unrestrained passenger vehicle occupant fatalities, all seat positions (FARS) On Track: Yes

Wyoming had 49 unrestrained fatalities in 2023 per WECRS. Wyoming is not on course to meet the goal of a five (5) year running average of 61 or less unrestrained fatalities by 2026.

Wyoming's observed seat belt usage is trending upwards. The HSO will continue implementing the countermeasure strategies throughout the state that includes high visibility overtime enforcement, mass media, coalitions, traffic safety and outreach, as well as Child Passenger Safety technician training, and inspection stations to reduce unbelted fatalities and injuries.

C-5) Number of fatalities in crashes involving a driver or motorcycle operator with a BAC of .08 and above (FARS) On Track: Yes

Wyoming had 33 alcohol-impaired driving fatalities in 2023 per WECRS. Wyoming is on course to meet the goal of a five (5) year running average of 48 or less fatalities involving a driver or motorcycle operator with a BAC of .08 and above by 2026.

State and local law enforcement participate in high visibility overtime grants in both NHTSA mandatory impaired driving enforcement campaigns and localized events which resulted in 406 DUI arrests in FY2023. Multi-jurisdictional DUI Task Forces are expanding around the State with support of the Governor's Council on Impaired Driving and the Law Enforcement Liaison. These task forces are well publicized within the communities, provide high visibility enforcement which serves as a deterrence to impaired driving, and offers support for agencies that are short staffed.

The 24/7 Program is currently active in Campbell, Fremont, Sheridan, and Teton counties with plans by the Governor's Council on Impaired Driving working to expand to other counties.

DRE/ARIDE/SFST training and recertification classes are offered to law enforcement officers to improve detection of impaired driving. Every attempt is made to provide training as close to an agency's location to lessen the amount of time an officer is away from patrol duties as well as travel time and costs. The Rocky Mountain Prevention and Traffic Safety Summit is conducted yearly targeting all aspects of traffic safety with an emphasis on impaired driving and prosecution.

The Traffic Safety Resource Prosecutor assists with educating prosecutors and law enforcement on strategies combatting defense tactics as well as current and ever changing drug trends. Other projects include a court monitoring project documenting sentencing challenges of impaired drivers and traffic safety education through public outreach.

C-6) Number of speeding-related fatalities (FARS)

Wyoming had 54 speeding related fatalities in 2023 per WECRS. Wyoming is not on course to meet the goal of a five (5) year running average of 42 or less by 2026.

Speed is a commonly used trigger offense to enforce Wyoming's secondary seat belt law. In FY2023, law enforcement garnered three thousand nine hundred sixty-four (3,964) speeding citations issued on grant funded overtime enforcement. In addition, this dangerous driving behavior is included in topics covered in traffic safety education classes and events.

C-7) Number of motorcyclist fatalities (FARS)

Wyoming had 15 motorcyclist fatalities in 2023 per WECRS. Wyoming is on course to meet the goal of a five (5) year running average of 20 or less motorcyclist fatalities by 2026.

The HSO continues to work towards lowering crashes, particularly fatal and serious injury crashes, through efforts focused on motorcyclist awareness for the traveling public along with the high visibility overtime enforcement focusing on impaired riding during Wyoming's short motorcycle riding season.

Additional efforts and activities that addressed motorcyclist awareness and impaired riding included partnering with Wyoming's Motorcycle Safety Program on projects that go beyond standard motorcycle training courses. Activities include traffic safety education at motorcycle rallies such as Ham 'n Jam, working with the motorcycle industry to partner at events attended by motorcycle enthusiasts, as well as working to develop and implement an educational program during off season on motorcycle safety. The Motorcycle Safety Program also promotes and educates via social media.

Wyoming had 9 unhelmeted motorcyclist fatalities in 2023 per WECRS. Wyoming is on course to meet the goal of a five (5) year running average 12 or less unhelmeted motorcyclist fatalities by 2026.

C-9) Number of drivers age 20 or younger involved in fatal crashes (FARS)

On Track: Yes

Wyoming had 12 driver's age 20 or younger involved in fatal crashes in 2023 per WECRS. Wyoming is on course to meet the goal of a five (5) year running average 16 or less drivers age 20 or younger involved in fatal crashes by 2026.

The HSO funds projects with the Wyoming Highway Patrol Safety Education, Injury Prevention Resources, Sheridan traffic Education, and Students Against Destructive Decisions (SADD) to continue to reach youthful drivers on safe driving behaviors. These projects provide all aspects of traffic safety education in schools, community events, or court ordered schooling and are making an impact on young driver crashes.

C-10) Number of pedestrian fatalities (FARS)

On Track: No

Wyoming had 11 pedestrian fatalities in 2023 per WECRS. Wyoming is on course to meet the goal of a five (5) year running average of less than 8 pedestrian fatalities by 2026.

As part of the Strategic Highway Safety Plan, WYDOT integrates the needs of pedestrians and bicyclists in its planning and project development processes to produce a transportation system with true modal choices. This plan will not propose specific improvement projects to better accommodate bicycling and walking in the Wyoming transportation system. Instead, it provides general principles and guidance for WYDOT to provide for and improve bicycle and pedestrian transportation. This plan also provides guidance for local governments in Wyoming for developing their own bicycle and pedestrian plans and facilities.

The HSO funds projects that focus on vulnerable roadway users to include the Native American Outreach Project which has developed a vulnerable roadway user campaign to educate pedestrians and bicyclists on how to be seen in their rural community, Cheyenne Regional Medical Center continued partnership with Safe Routes to School, and a new project with Wyoming Pathways that will raise awareness of state statutes, rights and responsibilities of all travelers, and best practices for decreasing the likelihood of injury or fatalities.

C-11) Number of bicycle fatalities (FARS)

On Track: No

Wyoming had 2 bicycle fatalities in 2023 per WECRS. Wyoming is not on course to meet the goal of a five (5) year running average of one (1) or less by 2026.

S-1) Distracted Driving (State)

On Track: Yes

Wyoming had 11 distracted driving fatalities in 2023 per WECRS. Wyoming is on course to meet the goal of a five (5) year running average of 11 or less by 2026.

The HSO will continue to partner with the Wyoming Highway Patrol, Sheridan Police Department, Injury Prevention Resources, and SADD to implement new ideas and strategies to combat distracted driving. Not only do these organizations work independently but also collaboratively as often as possible to bring knowledge and awareness to all Wyomingites on the dangers of distracted driving.

S-2) Drug Involved Fatal & Serious Injuries (State)

On Track: Yes

Wyoming had 74 drug involved fatal and serious injuries in 2023. Wyoming is on course to meet the goal of a five (5) year running average of 81 or less for 2026

The HSO funds projects that will continue to reduce drug involved traffic crashes. These projects include high visibility enforcement grants which have expanded to include multi-jurisdictional DUI task forces, advanced impaired driving training for law enforcement officers statewide,

prosecutor training, community education, media, and the Governor's Council on Impaired Driving Coalition

S-3) Wyoming Electronic Crash Reporting System (WECRS) Database Update On Track: Yes

This project is on course to create, maintain, and implement changes to the traffic records databases to enhance performance and quality. This will ensure consistency and accuracy of data elements of the State's crash reports, by utilizing hired expertise to implement improvements and upgrades to the Crash Records and Safety Data System.

S-4) Number of emergency response roadside crashes On Track: No

Wyoming had 147 emergency response roadside crashes in 2023. Wyoming is not on course to meet the goal of a five (5) year running average of 118 or less by 2026.

The HSO has implemented a project to educate the public through public information campaigns to reduce roadside deaths and injuries. This pilot project will incentivize measures by working with traffic incident responders, including EMS, on holding and/or attending a Traffic Incident Management (TIM) class and implement a TIM forum where the exchange of information including current practices, data collection, programs and technologies will help in decreasing these types of deaths.

B-1) Observed seat belt use for passenger vehicles, front seat outboard occupants (survey) On Track: Yes

In 2023, the overall estimate for all vehicle occupants based on the Wyoming's Survey of Seat Belt Use was 82% which was an increase over 2022 at 78.3%. Wyoming is on course to meet the FY2023 goal of a five (5) year running average of 81.1%.

Same countermeasure strategies as noted above for C-4) Number of unrestrained passenger vehicle occupant fatalities, all seat positions (FARS).

FY2023 Grant Program Activity Reporting

- A1 Number of seat belt citations issued during grant-funded enforcement activities Results: The number of seat belt and child restraint citations issued during FY2023 was one thousand eight hundred eighty-six (1,886). One thousand five hundred (1,500) were seat belt citations and three hundred eighty-six (386) were child restraint citations.
- A2 Number of impaired driving arrests made during grant-funded enforcement activities Results: The number of DUI arrests during the FY2023 grant-funded overtime enforcement four hundred six (406).

• A3 – Number of speeding citations issued during grant-funded enforcement activities Results: The number of speed citations issued during FY2023 was three thousand nine hundred sixty-four (3,964).

Note: speeding is used as a trigger offense to educate and cite/warn individuals not wearing their seat belts.
